supporting paragraphs. For a brief writing project, an *informal*, or *scratch*, *outline* may be all you need. A scratch outline is simply a list of your ideas in the order you want to present them. You can jot down your ideas in words, phrases, complete sentences, even pictures—whatever you need to jog your memory about what to put next. Here is a sample scratch outline for Betsy Smith's draft essay on conflicts within the environmental movement.

A *formal outline* is helpful when drafting longer, more complex writing projects. In a formal outline, roman numeral headings indicate your main ideas and capital letters and arabic numbers indicate your supporting points. Each point in your outline must support the idea at the level above it and must be supported by the points in the level below it.

A topic outline uses words and phrases to indicate the ideas to be discussed. A sentence outline uses complete sentences. Some writers prefer a topic outline because it is easier to construct. Others prefer a sentence outline because it provides a starting point for drafting. Compare a section of a topic outline with a section of a sentence outline for a later draft of Betsy Smith's essay:

Thesis: A major goal of the green movement is to find fossil fuel alternatives, but some environmentalists are concerned that wind, solar, and nuclear power sites will also harm the environment.

Topic Outline

Which type of outline you choose depends entirely on your own preferences, the complexity of your essay, and your instructor's expectations.
